# SRFD Profile

Sunriver Fire and Rescue is a professionally staffed and managed emergency services organization which provides exceptional service to the community.

Fire services are provided within the boundaries of the Sunriver community. Ambulance/medical services not only include Sunriver, but an area of more than 300 square miles.

The SRFD operates from one station located in the heart of Sunriver with a compliment of eleven career firefighters including; three Firefighter/Paramedics, three Engineer/Paramedics, three Captains, an Assistant Chief and Fire Chief. Our ability to provide superior service to the community is augmented by 18 Reserve Firefighters and an Office Manager.

The Department provides full service throughout the year with a fleet of apparatus which includes structural/rescue engines, wildland engines and fully equipped medic units.

Our agency is dedicated to preparedness with commitment and service beyond expectation.

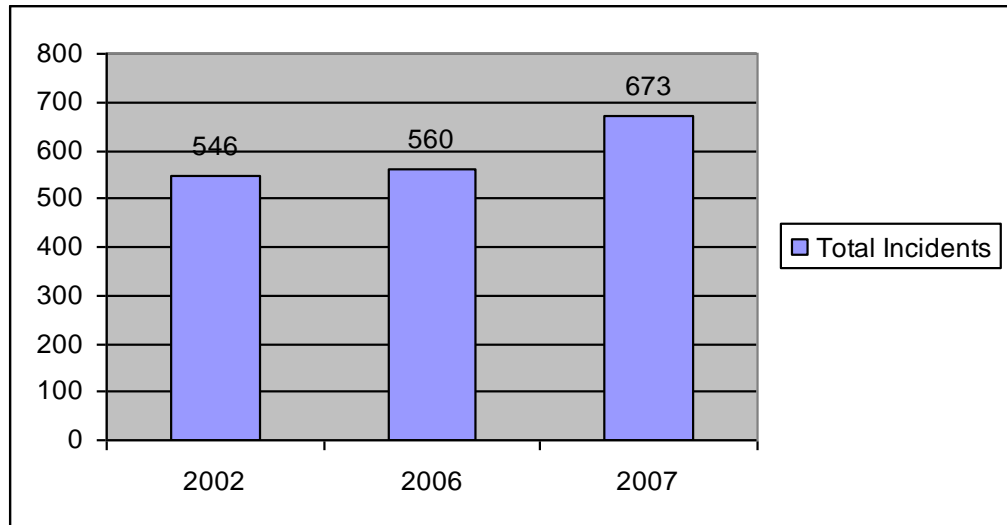

# Total Incidents

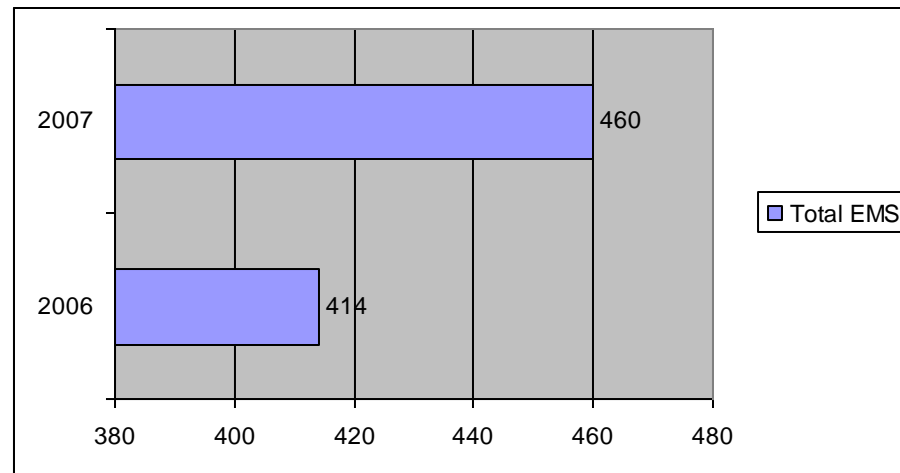
The Fire Department responded to 673 incidents in 2007 representing a 20% increase from the prior year.

# Rescue and Emergency Medical Services

Rescue and emergency medical service incidents accounted for 68% of all calls for service. The 460 incidents represented an increase of 11% from the prior year.





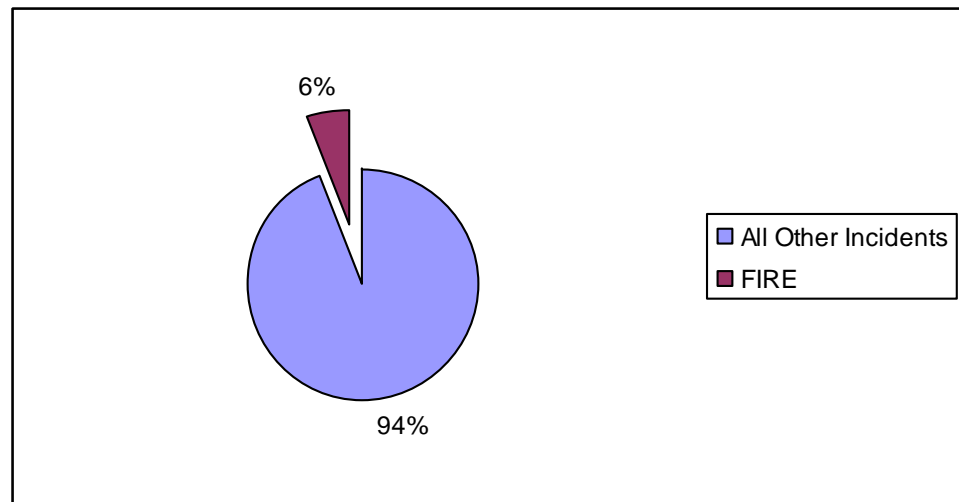

# Fire Incidents

The SRFD responded to 40 fire incidents in 2007, which was an increase of 100% from the previous year. Fire incidents accounted for approximately 6% of all calls for service.

Property damage due to fire was valued at \$622,000.



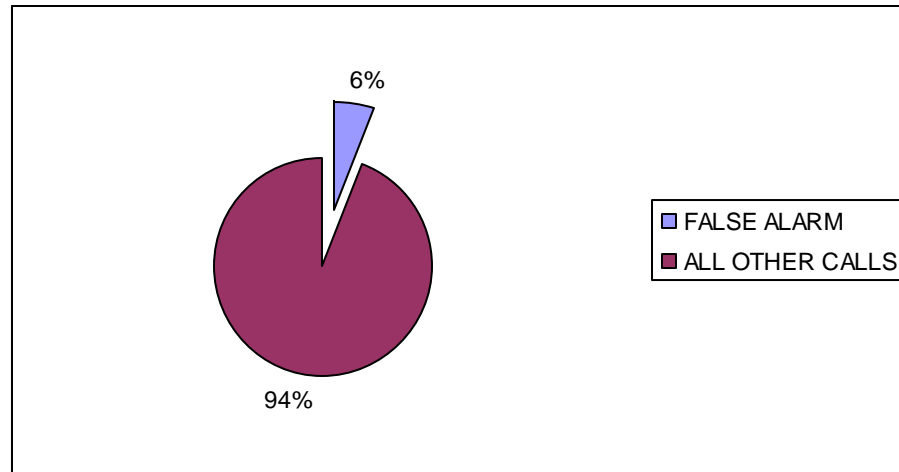

# False Alarm / False Call Incidents

False alarm calls, including monitored alarms deemed false, accounted for 43 incidents or approximately 6% of all calls for service.



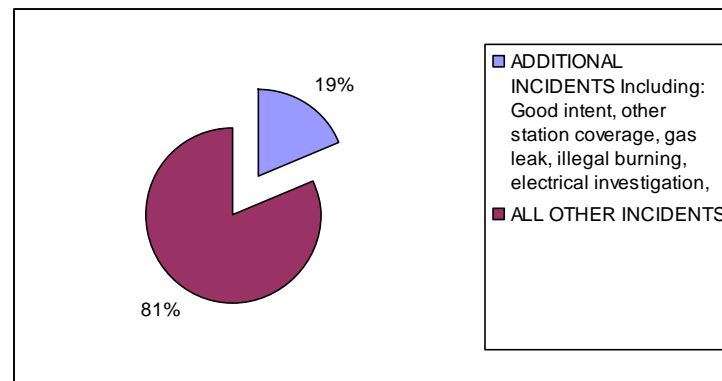

# Additional Incidents

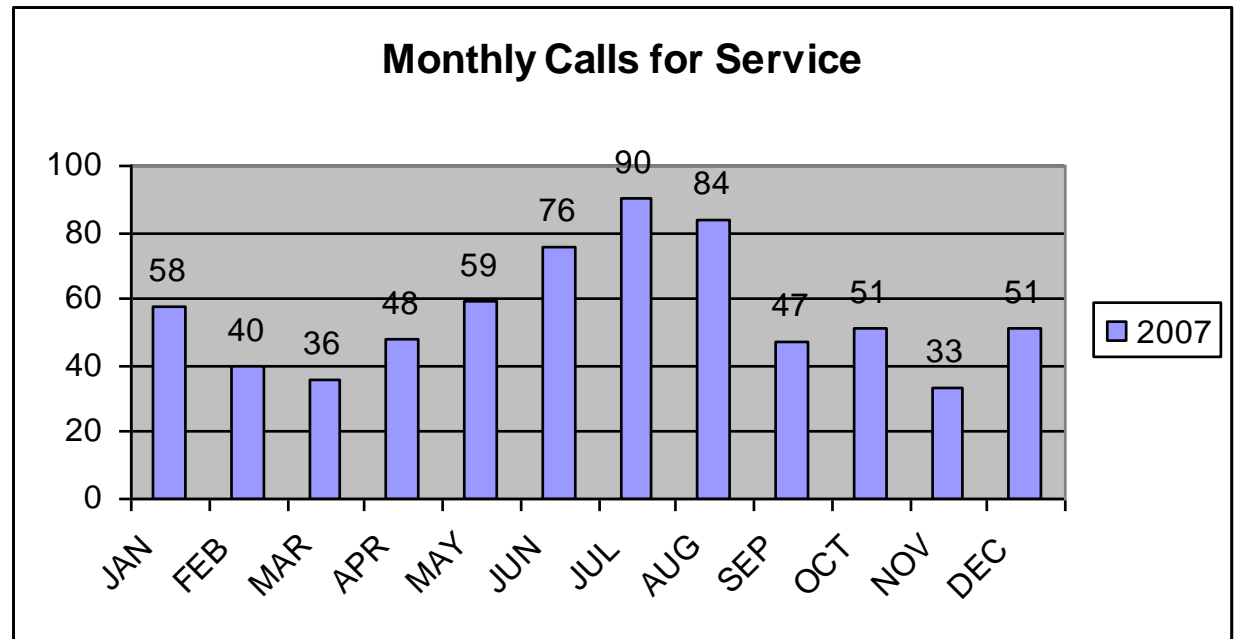
The SRFD responded to a variety of incidents beyond typical fire or medical service requests. Other incidents included illegal burning, other agency station coverage, natural gas leaks, good intent calls, electrical investigations and others. These incidents accounted for approximately 19% of all calls for service.

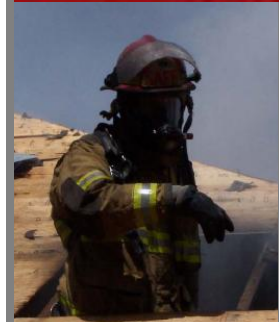

To provide a professionally trained and tested medical and fire response the SRFD conducts training daily. Training provides career firefighters, reserve and probationary firefighters the opportunity to maintain and enhance their skills so as to prepare them for a variety of incidents that can and do happen in the community.

In 2007 there were 5,299 hours of training for all Department staff.

# Apparatus – Structural Engines

To provide professional service to the community, the SRFD deploys a fleet of 9 apparatus including structural and wildland engines as well medic/ambulance units.

## **Structural Engine/Rescue 221**

2000 Pierce Dash custom cab, 1250 gpm pump, 750 gallon water tank, advanced life support equipped, carries the standard structural firefighting equipment, also carries heavy extrication equipment.



## **Structural Engine 223**

1990 Pierce Arrow, 1250 gpm pump, 500 gallon water tank, 50 ft ladder with master stream, carries standard structural firefighting equipment.

## Heavy Brush Engine 242

1995 Freightliner / KME, 1000 gpm structural pump, 110 gpm diesel powered auxiliary pump, 750 gallon water tank, carries special wildland firefighting equipment for interface firefighting.



## Light Brush Engine 241

1995 Chevy / custom box, 110 gpm gas powered pump, 250 gallon water tank, carries standard wildland firefighting equipment.
